## NORTH AMERICAN BUTTERFLY ASSOCIATION (NABA) COUNT

On July 5, 2014 seven teams of dedicated volunteers trekked across MacGregor Point and Port Elgin, the 'outback', 'blind line', 'underworld' and 'middle earth' to track, identify, and count butterflies in the 16th annual MacGregor Point North American Butterfly Association (NABA) count.

Like other areas across North America, MacGregor Point is responsible for a square of land, and volunteers set out on a day-long search for butterflies to help record numbers and species that frequent the area. These results are tabulated and submitted to NABA who use this information to track species rise and decline across the Country, as well as species diversity and range.

In total, 34 species were seen, and 4,509 individual butterflies were counted! This included 3,533 European Skippers, 377

Northern Crescent, and 176 Cabbage White, which always come out in large numbers. The groups also saw a combined 51 Monarch Butterflies. Some other sightings included Eastern Tiger Swallowtail, Viceroy, Question Mark, White Admiral and Northern Pearly-Eye to name just a few.

Although numbers were down this year, we did have a wide variety of species, wonderful weather and great company. The count concludes with the group tabulating the results and sharing their experiences from the day. This count always brings out a dedicated group eager to do their share. No experience is necessary. It is a great way to learn some new species and meet new people all while helping study our butterfly population.

- > BUTTERFLIES EMERGE FROM A CHRYSALIS, WHILE MOTHS EMERGE FROM A COCOON
- > EACH BUTTERFLY HAS A "HOST" PLANT IT RELIES ON FOR FOOD. FOR EXAMPLE, THE NORTHERN CRESCENT (RIGHT) RELIES ON HOST PLANTS IN THE ASTER FAMILY.
- > THERE ARE ABOUT 24,000 SPECIES OF BUTTERFLY, AND ABOUT 140,000 MOTHS
- > MANY BUTTERFLIES CAN TASTE WITH THEIR FEET TO FIND A GOOD LEAF TO LAY EGGS
- > MONARCH BUTTERFLIES INSTINCTIVELY MIGRATE TO MEXICO, A 4,000KM JOURNEY!
- > A BUTTERFLY CAN SEE THE COLOURS RED, GREEN AND YELLOW.

# HURON FRINGE BIRDING FESTIVAL

## 2014 FESTIVAL RECAP

The 17<sup>th</sup> annual Huron Fringe Birding Festival was held this year over the two weekends following Victoria Day, May 23-26 and May 29-June 1. The Festival was again a huge success with a record-breaking 104 new participants!

All 259 participants were treated to wonderful weather both weekends, with 80 events and 43 leaders. The numbers are kept small (12 to 22 per event) for daytime events to provide a positive, more personal experience. Evening events accommodate larger groups in the Visitor Centre at the Park, overall resulting in nearly 1,300 individual contacts.

We saw a record breaking 187 species of birds during the Festival. There was a late migrating Orange-crowned Warbler seen during the first weekend and a rare Connecticut Warbler behind the Visitor Centre on the second weekend. Also, Larry Lamb, one of our botany leaders, discovered a new plant, *Ajuga chamaepitys*, also known as Ground Pine or Yellow Bugle, in the Park during the Festival. This is the first recorded sighting of this non-native species in Canada.

MacGregor Point Provincial Park was explored, as well as the surrounding side roads with other events going south as far as Kincardine, north well up the Bruce Peninsula and into Grey County. Participants learned about birds, plants, wildflowers, trees, shrubs, photography, astronomy, butterflies, dragonflies, and bees as well as geology and geomorphology, important bird areas and e-Bird.

Many of our leaders were repeat performers and we attracted a large number of new folks as well. Our banquet was again well-attended with guest speaker David Lamble talking about Birds and Some of their Mysteries. The silent auction brought in more than \$1,200. A special thank-you to the many individuals who donated a wide variety of items to this event.

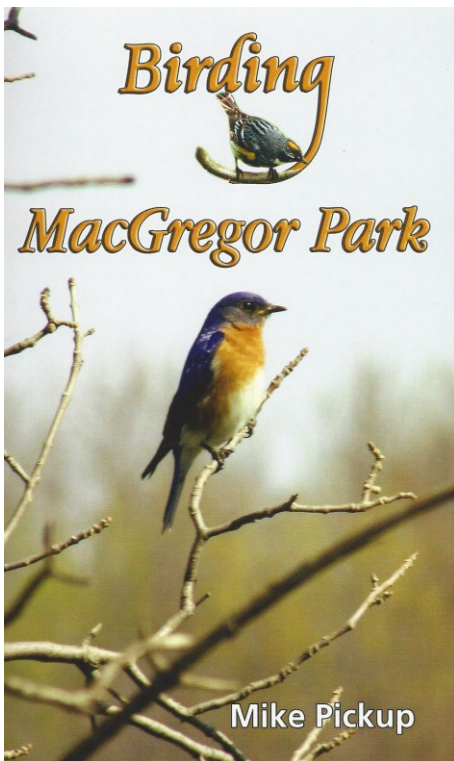

"The Friends of MacGregor Point Park"



Throughout the summer, MacGregor Point Provincial Park is sometimes lucky enough to get some really interesting storms. The Visitor Centre is a perfect location to watch storms roll over the lake, and so the Visitor Centre staff wanted to share a bit of the science behind this incredible natural phenomenon.

A storm needs instability in order to develop. Much of the process of weather-making depends on the simple fact that warm air rises and cool air sinks. When the atmosphere is stable the pocket of air cools at a normal rate. This means that any pocket of rising warm air quickly becomes cooler than the surrounding air and stops rising. But if the temperature decrease with height is greater than normal, rising warm air pockets do not cool down enough to make them cooler than the surrounding air. They continue rising to great heights, forming large convective clouds. This is an unstable atmosphere. Clouds are formed when the air in the atmosphere is so saturated with water vapour that it cannot hold any more of it.

### Thunderstorms need three things:

- **Moisture** - to form clouds and rain.
- **Unstable Air** - relatively warm air that can rise rapidly.
- **Lift** - fronts, sea breezes and mountains are capable of lifting air to help form thunderstorms.

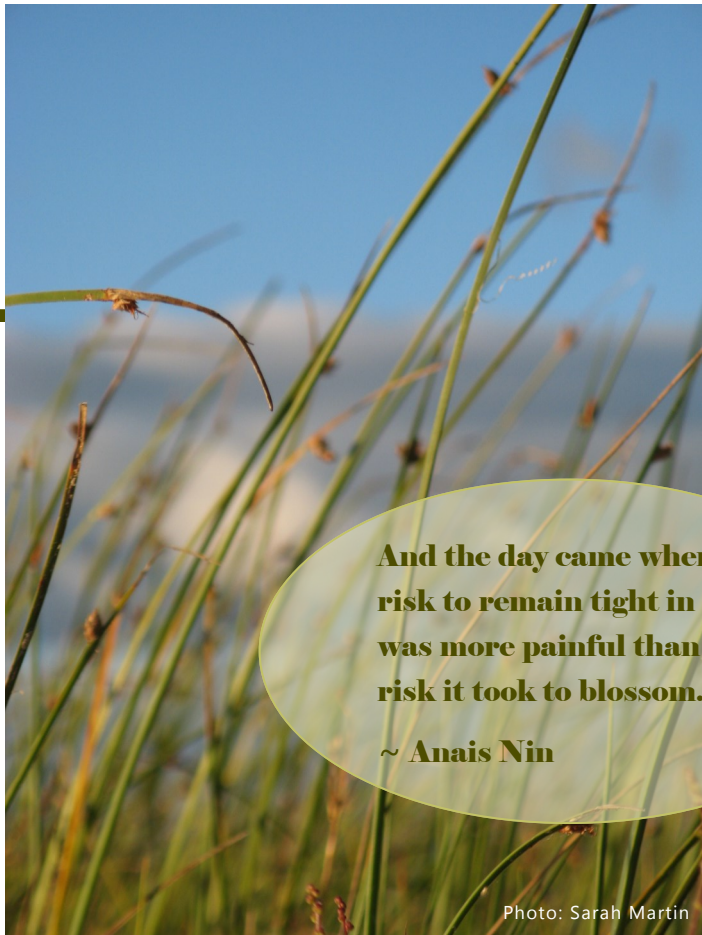


### MACGREGOR POINT THUNDERSTORMS

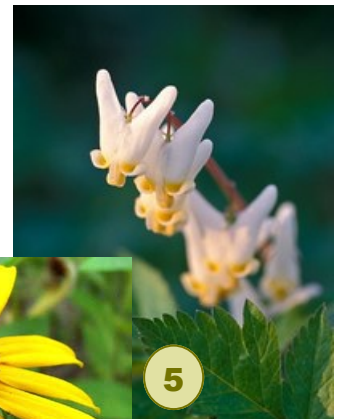

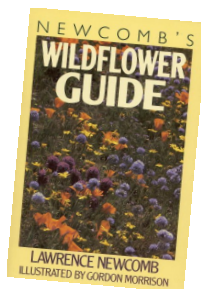

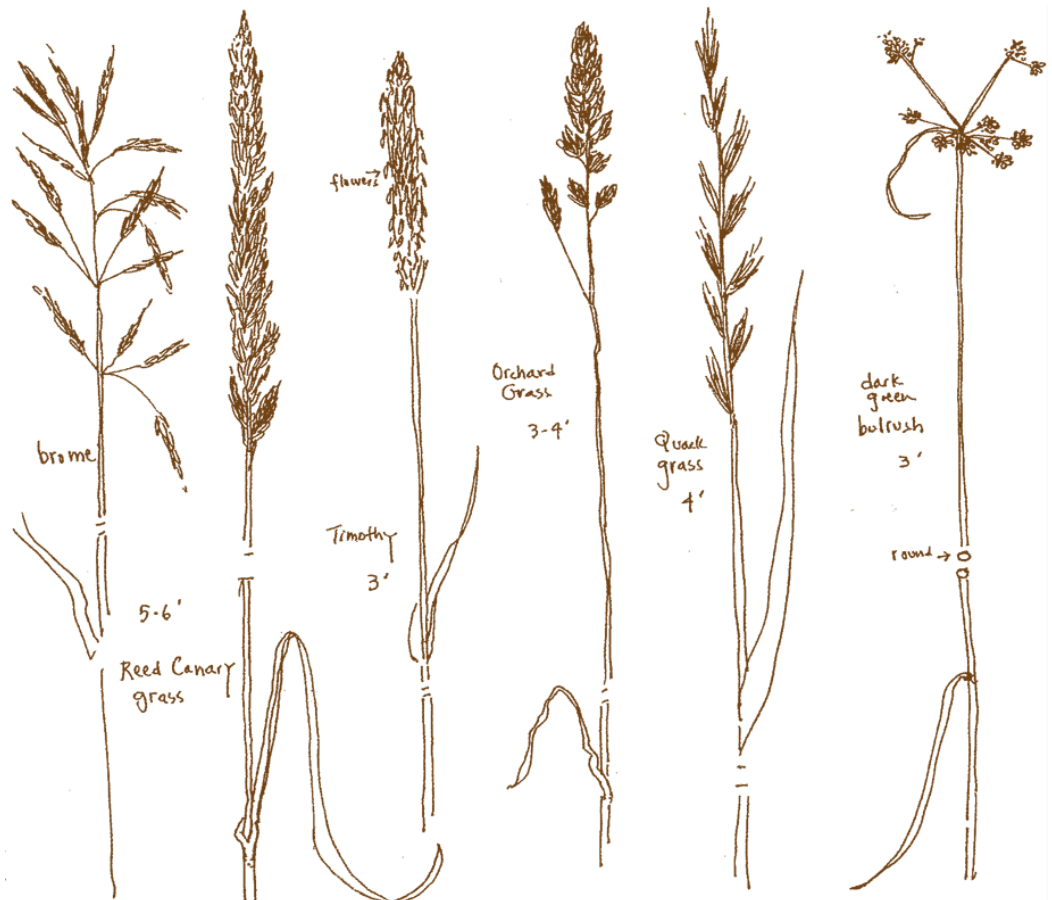
